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MOTHER KILLS SON, 3; SAYS HE 'CRIED TOO MUCH'

Mahanoy City, Pa., March 7 (AP)

A 32-year-old mother quoted by state police as saying she smothered her three-year-old son because he "cried too much" was held on a murder charge today in Pennsylvania's second baby-slaying in a week.

State Police Corporal C. D. Boyle testified at a hearing Monday night that the woman, Mrs. Gus Edinger, related she clamped her hand over the baby's nose and mouth as he lay in bed with her and another child early last Saturday.

Dr. W. R. Glenney said an autopsy showed the child was asphyxiated. Boyle quoted Mrs. Edinger as saying the baby disturbed her three other children with its crying and was "a nuisance."

At first the child's death was attributed to natural causes. Later, Detective Buono said, an investigation was started at the instigation of the Edingers' neighbors.

Meanwhile, not so many miles away at Millintown, another mother, Helen Wolf, was held on charges of being an accessory after the fact in the death of her two-year-old daughter who the state charges was beaten to death.

Paul W. Barrick, 22, described by state police Corporal Richard Gray as the Wolf woman's suitor, has pleaded guilty to a charge of slaying the child.

A deputy county coroner had tentatively decided that the Edinger child died of malnutrition. "The Edinger home is at Erier City, between here and Tamaqua."
